Save Our Ambulance Car – Save Swanage and Purbeck Lives



I expect many people in our community are aware by now that over the last two years the staffing of our Ambulance Car has halved, and the amount of time we have to wait for a response has doubled. For category 1 emergencies – stopped breathing, heart stopped beating, or unconscious and unresponsive – the average wait has gone from just under the target time of 7 minutes, to 15 minutes, which can only be a death sentence for many of these patients.

What's being done?

Both Swanage and Wareham Town Councils have pledged to do all they can to save our Ambulance Car, and will be meeting the Ambulance Trust and the Clinical Commissioning Group. Representatives of both Town Councils have also been liaising with Dorset Council, as Dorset has a statutory duty to address changes to health services that disadvantage residents. Furthermore, recognising that the closure of Poole A&E, Maternity and Children's units would mean long journeys from Swanage to access emergency hospital care, Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group promised Dorset Health Scrutiny in 2018 that Swanage-based ambulance resources would be fully maintained.

Save Our Ambulance Car campaign: residents continue to make our voices heard at Ambulance Trust Board and Dorset Council Cabinet meetings, in the media, and to fight for our Car, including considering legal proceedings.

What can I do?

Although there are over 8,000 signatures on Mel Norris' petition to Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group, it is not clear that these are being taken into account.

There is a separate petition to Dorset Council, where 5,000 signatures are needed to meet the bar for full Council. Dorset Council can ask Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group to carry out consultation in line with Gunning principles. If this is not done, or if the evidence does not support withdrawal of the Car, Dorset Council can send any plans to withdraw the Car back to the Secretary of

State for review. We have over 4,000 so please help us to reach the 5,000 if you have not signed this vital petition.

A message from the Mayor of Swanage

With Christmas well over a month ago, we're having a spell of very cold weather with sparkling frosty mornings. The darkest days of winter seem past, spring is signalled by the green shoots of bulbs in gardens, and daylight hours are noticeably longer.

It's looking as though the spring and summer in Swanage, will see the welcome return of our many events and festivals and the prospect of more contact with our friends and families. With most of us being double vaccinated, and very many having had the booster, let's hope that we are seeing the end of the pandemic. Perhaps we should spare a moment to think about how fortunate we are to have such a vaccination programme provided by our NHS, when many poor countries have had very little vaccination provision.

The government has taken us back to "Plan A", with people back to their places of work and face coverings no longer required by law in any setting. However, Public Health guidance is that we should continue to wear a face covering in crowded and enclosed spaces, where we come into contact with people we do not normally meet.

It's good to see the new planting done by Town Council staff along Shore Road. This interesting selection of plants should provide all-year interest and enhance the environment. The Town Council formed an Environmental Policy and Action Plan back in March 2020. The plan is "iterative"; this was a new word to me and I found it just means that the Plan is continues to develop and change as aims are achieved and new ones added. It covers items such as installing the solar panels that are planned, a single-use-plastic-free policy for events on STC land, drinking water taps on the seafront, managing The Downs in a way which increases biodiversity, and other initiatives. The Town Council works closely with Sustainable Swanage and an increasing number of volunteers are involved in that. We are fortunate to have such voluntary groups as Beach Buddies, who do much litter clearance on the beach and seafront, and Landers who, as the name suggests, clear from streets and verges. Thank you, Buddies and Landers, you enhance our town!

To end, here's what a friend, who often comes to Swanage, wrote in her Christmas card: "Swanage is looking well kept; the Mowlem is much improved, the Information Centre looks inviting and the bandstand looks pristine". What a great place to live in!

Your Warm and Generous Hearts see us through Tough Times

After the December/Christmas frenetic pace, January has seemed relatively quiet in the first week. But we're not quite halfway through the month, and the bills have started to arrive and monthly benefits are awaited, so already we're in great demand and expect the busy surge for the rest of the winter.

As the cold weather continues into February, our clients (like the rest of us) are facing higher charges for gas/electricity. But they are doubly disadvantaged if they have been put on pre-paid energy meters as a result of arrears or in certain rented accommodation where these are already installed. Swanage Food Bank has been able to help clients to 'top up' their meters by £40, but we have had to restrict repeated calls on our funds by the same clients to once only within 28 days and perhaps to lesser amounts of aid. Our dilemma is that whilst we do not wish households to struggle excessively with fuel poverty, neither do we want to cause dependency on our top-ups. Unfortunately, some clients find it hard to prioritise fuel costs and need extra help in budgeting their finances.

Because of General Data Protection Regulations, we don't refer clients to other agencies which may help with their Benefits and debt-management, but we do signpost them to Citizens Advice, Turn 2 Us, First Point, etc which they may access or not. Pre-Covid, the majority of our clients were already receiving such support, and the Agencies would arrange for us to provide food aid when necessary by phoning us and supplying our vouchers. But since Covid began, it's mostly self-referrals and there isn't the same professional knowledge of actual needs. At Swanage Food Bank, we are not judgmental, but are aware that lifestyle choices may in part result in some food poverty today. However, the majority of our clients work very

hard to support themselves and their families, and it is not easy for them to ask for Food Bank assistance.

We are very grateful to our Swanage Community for the wonderful support which we receive, not just at Christmas, but throughout the year. We always have shelves to fill, but our baked bean supply is still more than adequate (thank you!). Our current list of needs includes : **soup, tinned macaroni cheese, tinned vegetables, pasta sauces (jars), sugar, small packets of savoury rice, marmalade, medium-sized breakfast cereals including oats, tins of meat (cold and for reheating), and desserts of all kind.**

Way we all continue to care for one another with warm and generous hearts no matter what the wintry weather and darkness around us at the start of 2022.

Remember the 'use it or lose it' phrase?

Well, we've recently heard that some of the Dorset community hospitals are temporarily losing their MIUs - *not* Swanage I hasten to say – but it made me think I should remind you all that we must make the best possible use of our hospital services.

This is what Dorset HealthCare say about MIUs on their website:

'If you require urgent care, please call 111 or [go online](#) for an assessment. This helps us to provide the right support/treatment as quickly as possible, and could save you an unnecessary journey.

'If you turn up unannounced at the MIU, you will be assessed but could be directed elsewhere or given an appointment later that day or the next.'

You might need to access our MIU if you need treatment for:

- injuries to upper and lower limbs
- broken bones, sprains, bruises and wounds to shoulder, upper limbs, knee, lower leg, ankle and foot
- bites – human, animal and insect
- burns and scalds
- wound infections
- minor head injuries
- foreign bodies in eyes, nose and ear
- minor asthma attacks.

They can also provide emergency contraception, and may be able to help with minor ailments.

I'm afraid our Outpatient Clinics are still not back to pre-Covid times but if you are referred to a consultant, **please do ask your GP if you can be seen at Swanage**. Let's put the pressure on to get old and new clinics up and running as soon as possible.

UKMT British Mathematical Olympiad Round 1



On December 2nd 2021, Joe Daly (seen here) participated in the British Mathematical Olympiad Round 1. This competition is a follow-on round to the UKMT Senior Mathematical Challenge. As well as challenging high-scorers from the Senior Mathematical Challenge, the British Mathematical Olympiad is an entry point to the training and selection programme for international competitions. It is a 3.5 hours challenge that involves students solving 6 questions in total. Full written solutions were required, with complete proofs of any assertions made. Marks were awarded based on the clarity of a student's mathematical presentation.

This week, Joe's results were released. He achieved a Certificate of Distinction for his efforts – a fantastic achievement. As a result, The Purbeck School have entered him into British Mathematical Olympiad Round 2 of the competition, takes place on 27th January. In this round, Joe will be provided four questions to solve within 3.5 hours!

TREVOR CHADWICK OUR LOCAL UNSUNG HERO

The community project to commission a full-size bronze statue to commemorate a local unsung hero, Swanage schoolteacher, Trevor Chadwick, is hoped to be completed by the middle of this year.

THE STORY SO FAR

The extraordinary story of Trevor's awe-inspiring life is both fascinating and incredible. He was directly instrumental in saving the lives of 669 refugee children from certain annihilation by the Nazis at the outbreak of the Second World War.

The Trevor Chadwick Memorial Trust has been ongoing for some two years and has received tremendous support from our community. The entire cost of the project is expected to be in the region of £85,000. Two thirds of that sum has already been raised but there is still some way to go. The Trustees are planning to hold a Charity Auction, so do look out for full details of this event in next month's edition.

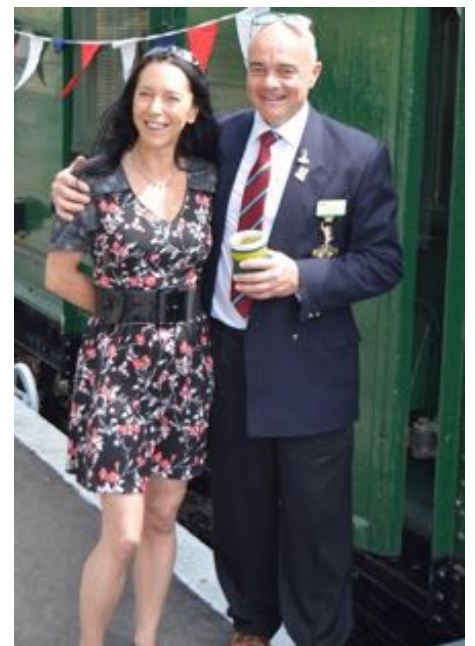
I urge you all to continue supporting the title well into the future and the paper will, in turn, be there to give our community a voice for decades to come.

Please quote the 5-digit reference number in the top right hand corner of the ECT (without the reference we will be unable to match the payment to the ticket). Thank you.

Planning and the Dorset Local Plan

A number of Dorset Town and Parish councils, as well as community groups, have expressed concerns about the proposed Dorset Local Plan which will set the pattern for new housing development up to 2038.

What difference would a Dorset National Park make?

National Parks are not subject to central housing targets, and with a National Park the whole of the Dorset Council area need not be subject to these central targets. The National Planning Guidance says that where a local planning authority (in this case the Dorset Council) shares an area with a National Park, then a local approach may be used to assess housing need and numbers, rather than the standard approach with its resulting housing targets. So, the Dorset Council in partnership with the Dorset National Park could assess and agree on a level of housing development for the whole Dorset Council area that appropriately reflects Dorset's needs, taking account of household projections and economic aims.

National Parks plan in partnership with communities and respond to local housing needs, including for truly affordable homes. The South Downs National Park (SDNP) helped to fund and facilitate around 60 Neighbourhood Plans which then helped to inform the Local Plan.

With a National Park, working in close partnership with the Dorset Council and communities, all Dorset can benefit from a locally relevant and responsive, partnership approach to planning. The sooner Dorset can secure a National Park, the sooner this partnership approach can begin.

Review of Landscapes

The Government published on 15 January its consultation paper in response to the 2019 national report, the Glover Review of Landscapes. The Dorset National Park Team's initial response to that consultation is on the website: <https://www.dorsetnationalpark.com/news> The consultation that the Government has launched seeks views on how National Parks and AONBs can do even more to bring people closer to nature, enhance the environment and boost biodiversity, improve mental and physical wellbeing and support local communities and economies.

MAKING MEMORIES

You may recall our successful campaign to raise funds and establish the post of a specialist Admiral nurse in Purbeck to help families cope with the special needs of people living with dementia. This was achieved by working in cooperation with Dementia UK and the NHS in 2017 and required an ongoing commitment from ourselves for a number of years.

In order to further support families, in 2019 we started a 'Buddy' visiting scheme. Following its forced closure in early 2020 we have been looking for other ways in which further support can be offered.

In October 2021, a group of student Nurses, with support from our group, the Mowlem trustees and Dorset Council (funding), set up **"Making Memories"** a monthly film with refreshments held at the Mowlem for families and individuals affected by dementia. This provided an opportunity to meet with others, enjoy the view, have a chat and watch a classic film. This was funded, as a trial, for six months and comes to an end after March 2022.

Now we have decided to attempt to continue and extend the **"Making Memories"** programme for a further period, by setting up a **drop-in Café** at the Mowlem.

This is to be twice a month on a **Tuesday from 10:30am until 12:30pm starting on 5th April** where we hope to meet and chat with families and other carers. Also, we will be **showing a film on the first Tuesday of April, May and June.**

There will be no charge, but any donations towards costs would be gratefully received.

Also, if you could spare a couple of hours to assist on some Tuesday mornings, to join us to chat with others and have a coffee, then we would be delighted to welcome you. We are planning to run one hour Dementia Awareness Courses for new helpers during February. These courses won't be 'mind-boggling'; just simple information and instructions of what's needed to help. Please contact our Chair (details below).

2022: Looking Forward with positive but cautious optimism

With the start of 2022, we are looking forward with some cautious optimism as to what the year ahead has in store for us.

Being positive, at the top of our agenda (as always it is) is further main repair works to the wooden Pier structure. We plan to start in mid-February with the renewal of a number of wooden piles near to the landward end of the wooden structure. This obviously requires the removal of decking and beams to permit the old piles to be removed, then the new ones being driven into the seabed, before beams and the decking is replaced.

Similar work will then be carried out within the vicinity of the intermediate landing stage, followed by work at the Pierhead. It is planned that this work will be completed by the start of the season in April 2022, though there may be some tidying up to be done for a short time after. Of course, you must consider that all these plans do depend upon the weather being favourable to us.

Whilst the piling works are going on, the Pier wooden structure will be closed and there will be no access for the public. However, the 1859 Café & Bistro, the Interpretation Centre and Gift Shop will be open for visitors to come and enjoy some refreshments in delightful surroundings and browse our quality selection of attractive merchandise.

STUDLAND SNIPPETS

Studland Parish Council is not increasing its Precept as there are more council tax payers than last year (maybe some second home owners decided to stay or holiday lets changed to residencies?). More than £40,000 is being raised, whilst there is approximately £90,000 in bank accounts. A little strange for a village with around 200 full-time residents? Future projects yet to be planned may explain the situation.

What should such a small village with an ageing population spend all this money on? Exercise equipment, footpath upkeep (Dorset Council duty), new pavements (Dorset Council), more tree planting and thicker hedges, allotments, a

Neighbourhood Plan, a 20mph speed limit (Dorset Council), blue plaques for George Bernard Shaw, John Maynard Keynes, Virginia Woolf, Bertrand Russell, HG Wells, John Poulson, Charles Voysey, Enid Blyton, Diana Spencer - let alone the wartime visitors to Fort Henry ?

A Jubilee tree is to be planted in the tranquility garden by the church. Restricted access?

Plenty of room in the gardens at Studland for everyone to plant a fruit tree this year. Make a Studland apple pie and cake celebration each autumn at a harvest supper? Fruit trees do not grow tall; are easy to prune, and are not subject to TPOs. Graft a Bramley onto a Quince stock and it will survive honey fungus. Food for action led by the councillors?

The Council is taking on the upkeep of the village pond at Beach Road. A neglected public area overgrown with weed and an over-green surface. Plenty of volunteers needed. Hope you notice the difference in a year.

Knoll House redevelopment plans are likely to go to Dorset Council in February. It is unclear how the significant rebuild will sit with the designated Heathlands, let alone accommodate additional car parking. Parking spaces at the beach are being threatened by erosion. The human footprint is impacting severely on this attractive area. Are the international designations to be protected? The Dorset Heathlands are rarer than the world's rain forests. A case for radical solutions: no cars; fewer cars; less visitors - certainly fresh thinking away from conventional wisdom.

Another sale of a former council house by Aster, the housing association capitalising on the increased capital value. House prices in Studland are way above any reasonable affordability ratio, especially with low local incomes. Surely Aster should be re-investing in the local communities where there are shortages of affordable and social housing?. Have the housing associations been subject to mission drift in that they are profit-making businesses by another name ?

Plans are afoot for a Jubilee celebration on Ballard Down with a beacon plus food and drinks. Watch out for this merriment.

Did anyone see the Fire on the heath by the golf course? Strange no one admits to starting it.

The Purbeck Society. A marvellous talk on 14.01.22 by Nick Jubber on a European Journey - full of the wonder of the oral tradition and the power of imagination via stories. Next talk by a Swanage artist and dancer and AGM on 11.02.22 at the Mowlem Institute at 14.30pm. All welcome.

The Purbeck Society objected to proposals to remove the provision of affordable housing from the planning permission granted for the former St Mary's school site. Since the planning permission was granted, the average price of a detached house in Dorset has increased by around 30% - more than enough for the developers to go ahead as required. The whole matter shows the extent of how the broken housing market is adversely affecting those wanting to enter the housing market, let alone to

have a place to live in the area where they grew up. More thinking and action may be required to stem the exclusion and outflow of local young people from living in the area. Maybe a second homes policy for all new builds like St. Alves and a tighter local connections policy. Over to our Dorset Councillors and the Dorset Local Plan? Is Swanage an open field for developers to plead viability, to pull down houses and build flats for second homes and Airbnbs?

Further concerns exist over the inability of residents to access the weekly planning lists and tree work applications. Why is local government at the unitary level becoming so distant from the residents of Dorset?

Currently, planning case officers responsible for planning applications are also responsible for enforcement. Is this not a potential conflict of interest, especially as Dorset Council states that it is there to facilitate development?

CPRE Dorset supports a re-think of the Dorset Local Plan as advocated by Dorset Climate Action Network. This re-think argues for a) lower housing numbers b) more dedicated affordable housing for the residents of Dorset and c) compatibility of the Dorset Local Plan with the Dorset Council strategy for dealing with the climate and ecological emergencies. Maybe we should start with more solar panels on roofs other than listed buildings; net carbon zero for all new houses? Did you know that 96% of the buildings in Dorset have no solar panels?

Research is continuing into the exceptional circumstances of Dorset that limit the capacity to take the proposed 39,000 extra houses as advocated by Dorset Council. 9,000 of these houses have been offered to the Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole conurbation as an overflow, even though they have not been asked for. Rather strange for Dorset, especially as the conurbations are questioning their housing numbers; in part due to international students leaving after their courses finish and less inward migration

Currently Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole are holding an Issues and Options consultation on their Local Plan. Choices are being presented to residents and their views are being sought. What a contrast to Dorset Council where the residents are told of the nature of the developments rather than having an initial ability to shape the vision for the area. A most serious matter for everyone in Dorset.

Looking forward, Dorset CPRE is considering raising the profile of Dark Skies and addressing light pollution, including the need for filters on LED street lights. Additional work on flooding and nitrates in water courses are topics that will need to be addressed in and around the emerging Dorset Local Plan. The rivers of Dorset and Poole Harbour, let alone Swanage Bay, may well need action to clean them up rather than allow continuing pollution.

This helped us to understand what is being progressed in Swanage and beyond, based on a concept first practised in Frome, Somerset, linking various

caring type organisations together to support people in difficulty and providing a signpost to help for the beleaguered GPs and other health professionals etc.

At the January meeting we had a much larger gathering as folk began to emerge having had their 3rd vaccinations, making them feel more able to meet others. We presented cheques to the 2 charities that we have supported over the last 2 years. We gave them each £1,500 to add to the £200 we gave last year. Both The Besom and The Dorset Children’s Foundation were very grateful and surprised at how much we had raised during a difficult 2 years. They were also interested to hear the talk about Wellbeing Swanage.

February will see us voting for the next local charities that we might support for the coming year. Also, we will be having a fun talk by Anne Bond on being ‘A High Sheriff’s Wife ‘ for a year, which involved some interesting and sometimes funny experiences. It should be very entertaining.

March is our AGM which we usually accompany with a fun activity. This year it falls on Pancake Day so you can imagine what we will doing!!!

Our satellite groups of walkers, strollers and book clubs have all continued outside or on Zoom and our Lunch Club reconvened in the autumn for the first time since the initial lockdown which is good news. Our textile group should restart after Easter.

Keep the heart of Swanage beating



Sad News to kick off 2022 as Defibrillator goes missing

Normally at the start of the year we would be writing to let you know about our plans and intentions for the year ahead; however, we start 2022 with some sad news. One of our defibrillators, which was located at Swanage Rowing Club, has gone missing. Originally we thought it had been deployed to an incident in good faith and it had somehow been forgotten to be returned. The Ambulance Service was contacted but had no knowledge of its deployment.

Following a social media campaign which reached over 10,000 people, we still have no knowledge of where our defibrillator and the accompanying trauma kit is. Consequently, we had to report the matter to Dorset Police and consider it has been stolen. The cost to replace the device and the trauma kit is in excess of £1,000 - not to mention the cost to someone's life should the missing device be needed in the meantime. Ultimately, it means we start our new year with an unforeseen fundraising campaign to replace the Sea Rowing Club defibrillator.

All our devices across Purbeck have been generously funded by local residents, visitors and organisations and it is to them we turn again for help. If you have any knowledge of the missing device or are able to assist with fundraising its replacement, please do get in touch. **Donations can be delivered to Corben's Estate Agents, Station Road, Swanage.**

In some positive news, the partnership continues to maintain and grow the estate, having recently been gifted a device for North Swanage. Discussion is currently underway with stakeholders with regards to its installation and we hope to have this completed in the first half of this year.

As a partnership, our focus has shifted from locating new devices (except where gaps in coverage have been identified) to maintaining and future-proofing the estate. Perishables such as batteries and pads require replacement and some cabinets are starting to show signs of ageing thanks to our sea air and coastal weather. Future fundraising will primarily be ring-fenced for this project over the next few years.

CHANGE DRAFT DORSET LOCAL PLAN



17 January saw the launch of the **Dorset Deserves Better** campaign.

This campaign aims to change the Dorset Local Plan, by which Dorset Council proposes to build over 39,000 new dwellings – plus roads, car parks & services – and encroach on our Green Belt, our famous Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty – (AONB) – and other locally valued greenfield land. Thirty-eight (38) Dorset-based organisations – representing over 20,000 local people – have come together in a Campaign Alliance led by Dorset Climate Action Network (Dorset CAN) to press Dorset Council to **re-think** its damaging Local Plan. In an Open Letter delivered to the Leader of Dorset Council, Cllr. Spencer Flower, the Campaign Alliance states that the draft Local Plan would:

- Do great harm to Dorset, through adverse impact on its natural environment, landscape and historical character
- Fall short of meeting the needs of Dorset’s population for the right houses in the right place at the right price
- Fail to face up to the global challenges of climate change and reversing the loss of wildlife.

The Campaign Alliance notes that many respondents opposed the Local Plan. “91 per cent of those represented in the public consultation rejected the development strategy at the heart of the Plan.” Instead, the Alliance suggests ways to transform the Local Plan into a visionary programme that enriches the county and serves the people of Dorset – especially the young and those most in need.

Michael Dower, of Dorset CAN, said: “We sincerely hope to persuade Dorset Council to deliver an optimistic and forward-looking Local Plan that values our landscape, supports environmental regeneration, provides affordable housing for local families, reduces our carbon footprint and encourages a thriving green economy in Dorset. We believe this can be done within the existing regulations and without wholesale destruction of our green spaces. We hope to work with Dorset Council to achieve this.”:

Young local journalist Daniel Shailer talks us through “How to Restore and Rewild our Wetlands”

Wetlands are a golden ticket in the fight against climate change. They absorb carbon, as well as providing a home for countless species: from iconic British birds like the curlew and recently reintroduced common-crane, to almost a third of the UK’s flowering plants, to any number of reptiles amphibians and fish. They are as biodiverse as Brazilian rainforests and tropical coral reefs, suck up more carbon than any terrestrial ecosystem in the UK and, yet, we have lost 90% of our wetlands in the last century alone. Here are some ways we can bring them back.

Natural Flood Management techniques (NFM) encompass any human intervention which slow water flow. Planting trees that spread a mesh of roots into a stream, building ‘leaky dams’ and even filling in river beds (called ‘Stage 0’ restoration) all encourages water to seep into the land surrounding rivers, creating wetlands. Trialled across the US and UK, NFM have seen more success than traditional water management strategies – like ‘hard’ concrete damming – but remain expensive to upkeep.

Another alternative may be re-introducing long-extinct, but native, beavers. Colin Thorne, geography Chair at Nottingham University, put it best: ‘[beavers] work 24/7, 365 days a year as if their lives depend on it (because they do) and you don’t have to pay them or nothing.’ By building lodges and dams, beavers engineer wetlands around them: ecosystems more resistant to flooding, wildfire and drought, like pockets of ecological Eden. Introduced in the right place with the right monitoring, beavers have proven the most cost-effective, long-term method of wetland restoration.

Wetlands alone won’t fix our climate crises, but they can be one part of the solution. However it happens, restoring wetlands has to be a priority for the UK’s environmental future.

The Planet Purbeck Youth Group (PPYG) is a group of passionate, young individuals committed to making a difference to our world. The group is facilitated by the Purbeck Youth & Community Foundation, the National Trust, and of course, Planet Purbeck. PPyG want to spread the word, engage other young people, and make change happen. This year they have committed to running six events, with the aim of connecting other local young people to nature and fighting the ecological and climate emergency. The group meets every Wednesday at the Wareham Youth Club from 6-8pm and are always welcoming to new members!

PPYG also had an incredibly successful Christmas event - have a read of their reflections below:

'The 'Green Christmas' Event was a gathering organised by Planet Purbeck Youth Group to try and engage more of the youth in environmental activities. We hosted a range of activities such as wreath making from natural willow, a 'natural' photo wall and put up some environmental quizzes'.

'We met up at 2 to divide into decorating the youth centre and collecting willow from the common. We had prepared everything, including a Christmas film, hot chocolate station and food tables. Once people came in they put pine cones in boxes for a survey and then walked round different stations, trying different things out and talking to everyone. Our aim was to have an informal 'get together' with a subtlety of awareness for the environment where people could hang out and enjoy getting ready for Christmas! We watched a short environmental piece before our own film, one in between and one at the end, but each only about 2 minute long. We then set up a walkout survey while people filtered out.'

'I think the event went really well and we achieved what we wanted to as there was quite a turnout of people, and we managed to make some visitors aware whilst also not overloading them.'

'I think that if we were ever to host another event, we have learnt that not pressuring people to do certain activities and letting them mingle worked quite well. Also, putting up activities that would interest teenagers more (eg the selfie wall) were very popular.'

In response, we are developing a Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) to make bus services:

- more attractive
- cheaper
- easier to use
- faster
- more reliable
- greener

The BSIP will be updated annually.

We will deliver the BSIP through an Enhanced Partnership, which means we will work more closely with local bus operators to improve services. The Enhanced Partnership will be delivered by April 2022.

We also want to hear from public, private and voluntary organisations who have an interest in making our bus services work better.

The key milestones are:

- June 2021 – we published [Notice of Intent](#) to proceed with the development of an Enhanced Partnership
- October 2021 – publish first Bus Service Improvement Plan
- November 2021 – Enhanced Partnership Statutory consultation
- April 2022 – activate Enhanced Partnership

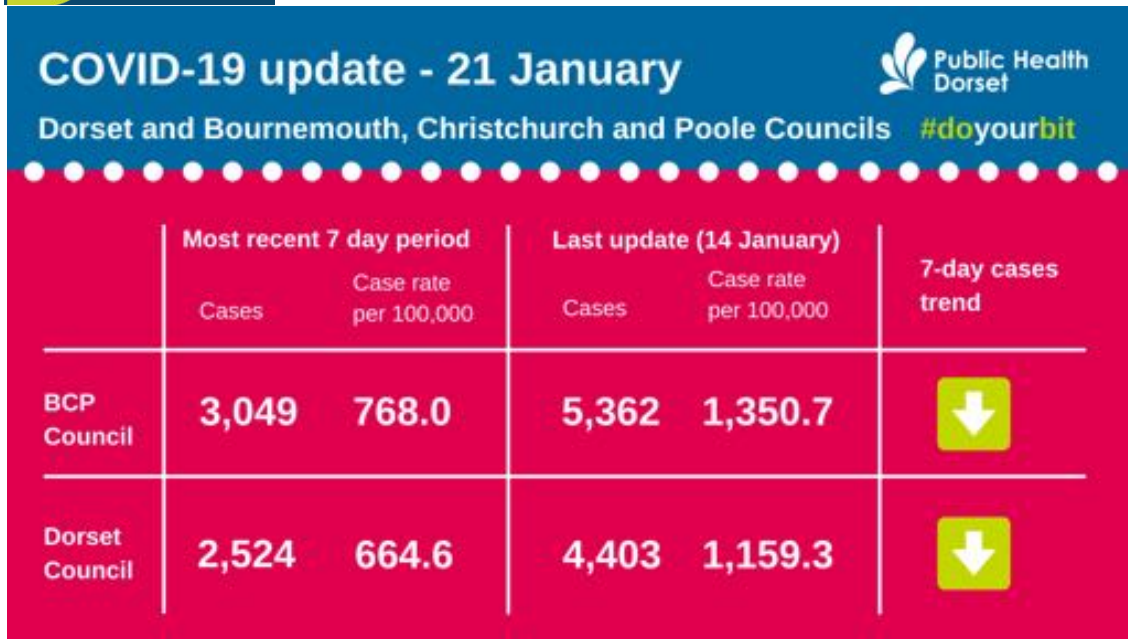

Covid-19 update from Public Health Dorset

Infection rates in Dorset have fallen steeply from a peak in early January. This is a similar picture to the national trend and case rates in Dorset are now below the average rates for England and the South West.

Infection rates remain high and there are still thousands of people catching COVID-19 across Dorset each week.

We've also seen a reduction in the number of people in hospital in Dorset with COVID-19 and the number of deaths related to the virus remains relatively stable.

Covid restrictions lifted

The government has announced that the measures put in place under plan B in England will be lifted from 27 January. You can choose to continue to follow these safer behaviours to protect yourself and others:

- [Get vaccinated](#) and get your [booster dose](#)
- Wear a face covering in most indoor public places and on public transport
- Let fresh air in if you meet indoors, meeting outdoors is safer
- [Get tested](#) and self-isolate if required
- Take lateral flow tests regularly, especially before meeting others
- Wear a face covering in indoor crowded spaces
- Get plenty of fresh air by meeting outdoors or opening doors + windows inside
- Self-isolate and get a PCR test if you develop any symptoms of COVID-19
